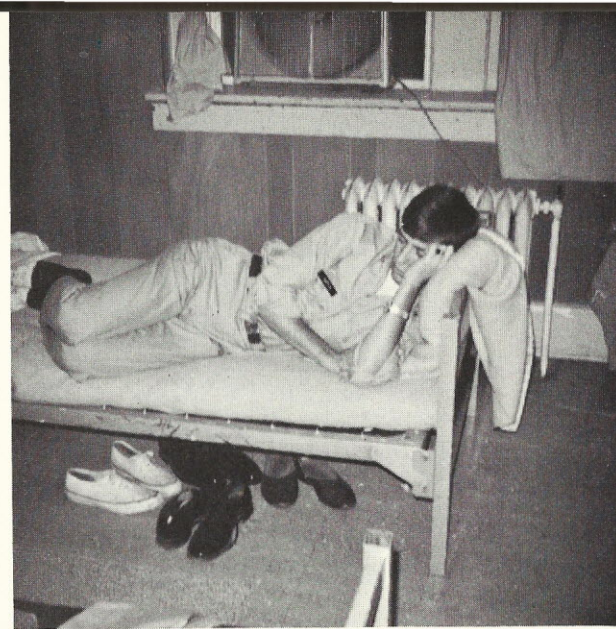


Our Telephone Room

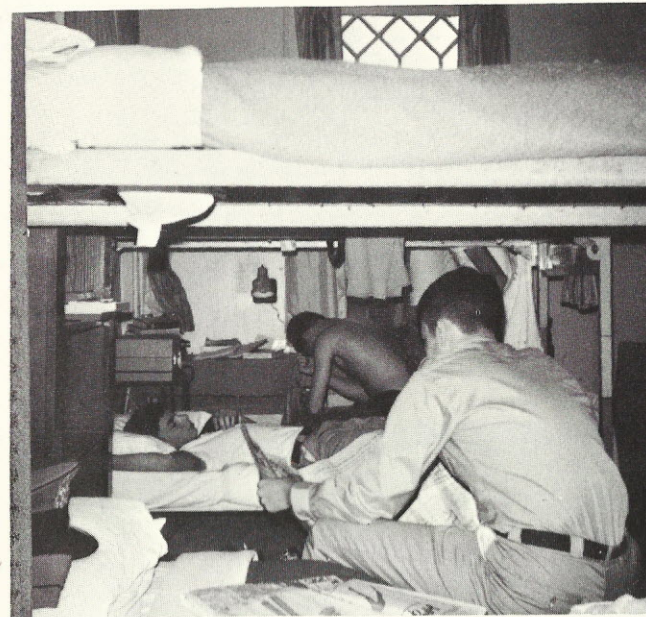
Obstacle Course

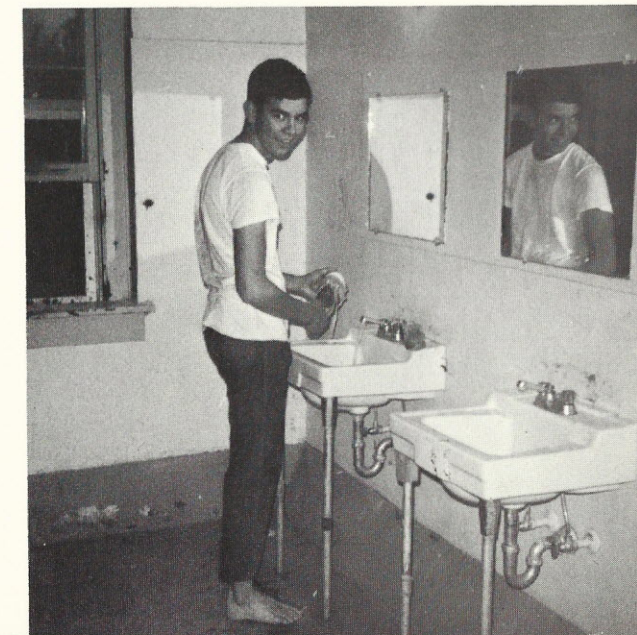
CHA IS: mailcall after lunch. It's getting a letter from one special girl or it's getting a care package from home.

It's taking a good long look at your new teachers and sizing them up immediately as to whether or not to like them. Then it's finding out that they are not at all like you thought they would be.

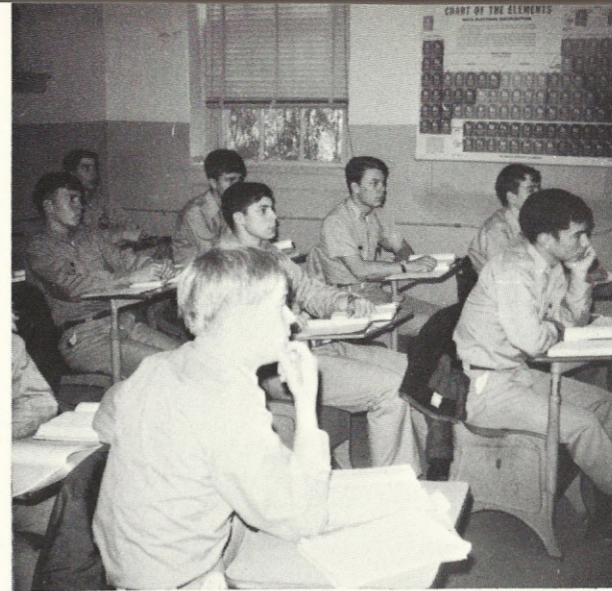
It's walking into a class and having announced to you that your book report is due on Friday (if you will remember). You haven't even checked out a book, much less begin to read it.

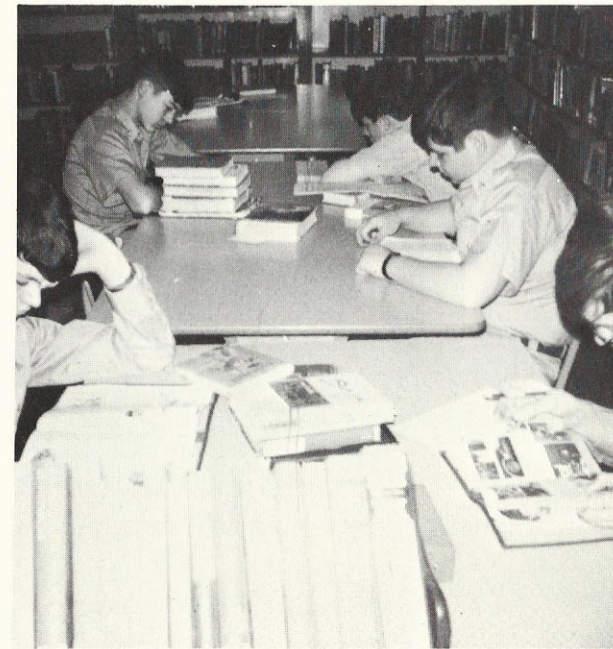


CHA is having everyone else know exactly what mail you got before you find out yourself. Then it's being glad they do know, because you got a letter from your girl.

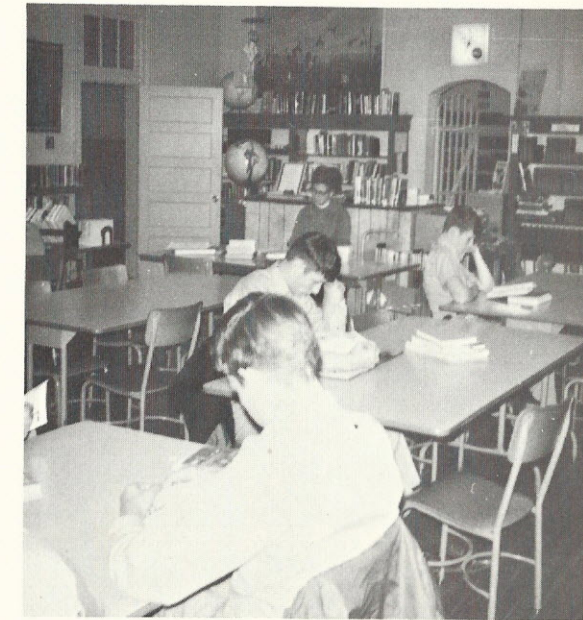


CHA is getting into the infirmary because you have got a test and then not being able to get out, because you really do become ill.

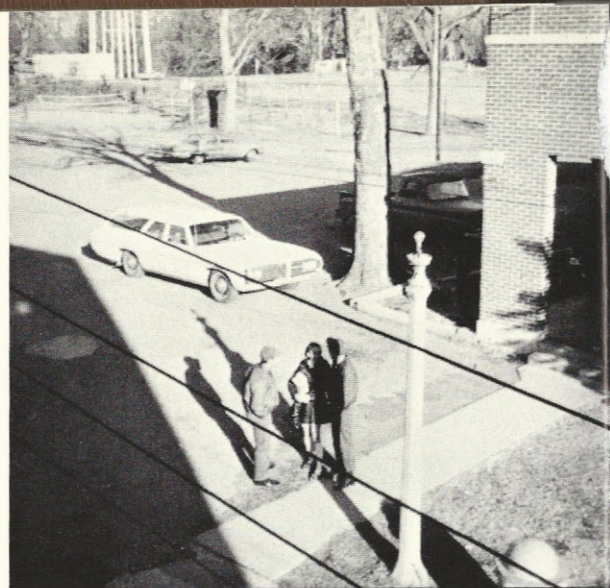
I CAN TELL YOU MANY THINGS ABOUT CHA!

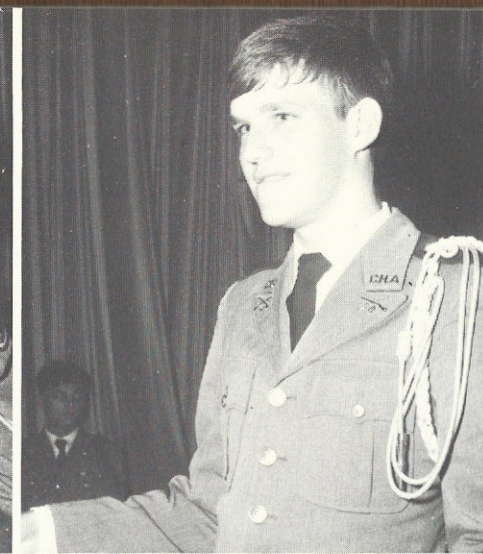


SENIOR SPEECHES

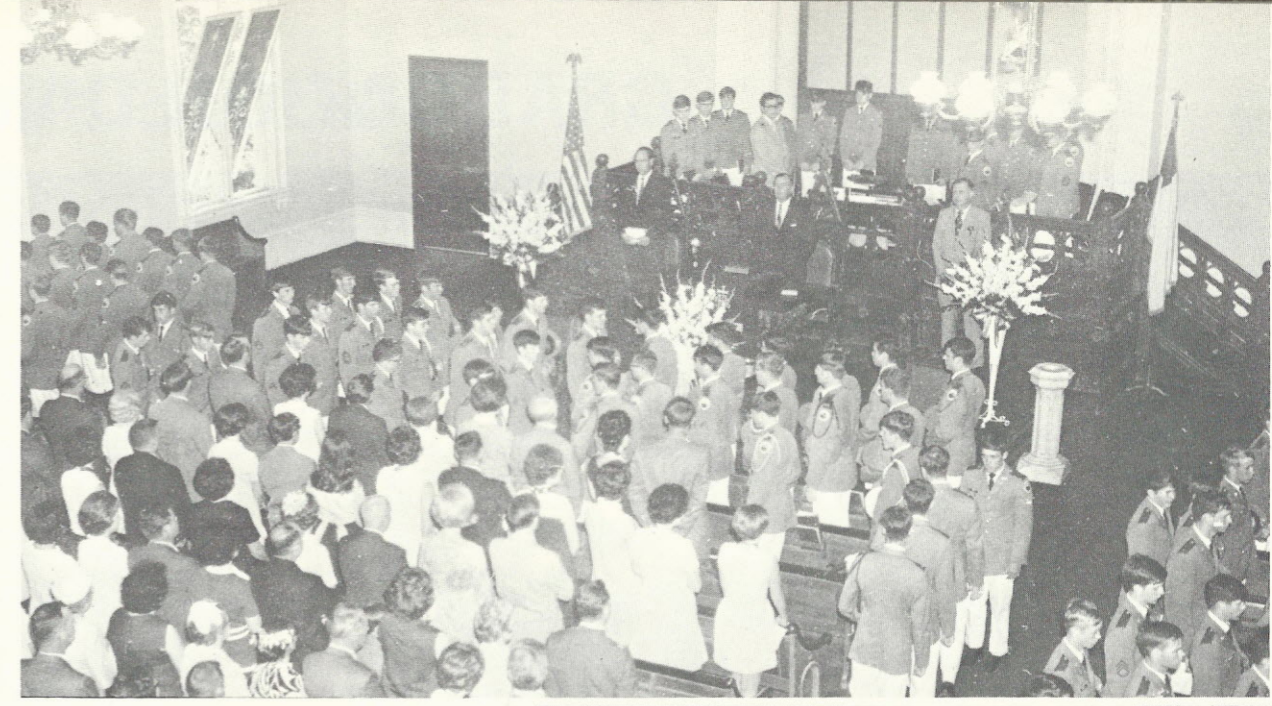
BACCALAUREATE

And thus the saga of Chamberlain-Hunt Academy 1969--1970 draws to a close. The end of this year has a special nostalgia for the friends and associates of CHA. For with the opening of the next session of CHA something new will be added--girls will be admitted as day students.

The world is changing and CHA must change with it. None of us are completely vulnerable to what new times bring.

But with change comes a whole new spectrum of possibilities, hopes, dreams, aspirations, and ideas. With a proud heritage we move forward with an even prouder hope for what the future holds for CHA.
