Chamberlain-Hunt Academy is a college preparatory, military school for boys located in the rollings hills of southwest Mississippi in Port Gibson. The Academy enjoys a heritage dating back to 1879 when Mississippi Presbyterians established a secondary school at Port Gibson to offer "a classical secondary education in a thoroughly Christian atmosphere." ## PHILOSOPHY AND PURPOSE

Chamberlain-Hunt believes that each student entrusted to its care has certain God-given talents which he has an obligation to use. If, through self-neglect, he is not using, training or developing these talents, the Academy will make every effort to motivate him to do so. Each student is a God-created individual and it is the concern of the staff that "he grow in wisdom and in stature, and in favor with God and man".

In our permissive society of today too many of our youth lack the discipline and drive to succeed in the art of living. The disciplined, Christian atmosphere on campus can mean that a student can grow, develop and mature into a disciplined, stable Christian adult rather than an untrained, undisciplined, individual who will become a parasite on society.

We feel that all youth have the right to the best the adult world has to offer, but they should realize their obligations to self and society for the privilege of having access to a formal education. The Church, home and school have their part in the education of youth. However, for those entrusted to the care of the Academy, it supplants the home in the influence on the cadet. We accept this responsibility as a sacred trust and are aware that only through the guidance of God can we realize the goal of being a vital, functioning arm of the Presbyterian Church.

Chamberlain-Hunt Academy is a college preparatory, military school located in the rolling hills of southwest Mississippi at Port Gibson. The Academy enjoys a heritage dating back to 1879 when Mississippi Presbyterians established a secondary school at Port Gibson to offer "a classical secondary education in a thoroughly Christian atmosphere". Chamberlain-Hunt is an outgrowth of Oakland College, which dates back to 1830. Dr. Jeremiah Chamberlain, a Presbyterian minister from Pennsylvania, came to the then largely unsettled and unorganized southwest to bring the message of the Church and to establish and educational institution to train teachers and ministers in this rapidly developing section. Oakland College, in the southwest corner of Claiborne County, close to the banks of the Mississippi River, opened its doors in 1830 under the administration of Dr. Chamberlain and proceeded to enrich the southwest with its many distinguished graduates.

## Our Heritage

Oakland was most fortunate to have as its Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Mr. David Hunt, a wealthy planter of the area and an ardent supporter of education. Through years of near continuous financial crisis, Oakland survived until the beginning of the great conflict between the States in 1861. The onset of the War saw the staff, faculty and student body alike enter the service of their country. A feeble effort was made immediately after the War to re-open the college, but without the driving leadership of Dr. Chamberlain and the financial acumen of Mr. Hunt, the doors were permanently closed in 1867. After the closing of the institution, the property was sold to the state of Mississippi for the purpose of establishing a negro college. The proceeds of this sale was used to satisfy the creditors of the college and the remainder of the funds were used to establish Chamberlain-Hunt in 1879.

## STAFF

The Academy administrative staff includes the President, Principal, Admissions OfficerPublic Relations Director, Commandant, Assistant Commandant, Chaplain, Bookkeeper, Dietitian, Nurse and adequate clerical assistance. The teaching staff includes a full-time librarian, a developmental reading specialist, and twentytwo instructors. The staff numbers seven members with advanced degrees, and nearly all can boost graduate work. Staff represents an average of ten years experience as instructors or administrators. The coaches of the various athletic teams are drawn from the faculty as are all the directors of extra-curricular activities. Nearly half of the staff live on campus and eat their meals in the Academy dining hall.

## ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The curriculum at Chamberlain-Hunt is essentially college preparatory with sixteen units in the area of English, foreign language, science, mathematics, social studies or business education required for graduation, along with two years of Bible. Subjects offered include those courses required by the major colleges of the South. Instructors are carefully chosen for their professional qualifications and desire and ability to work with young people. The Academy is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Mississippi Accreditation Commission and the Mid-South Association of Independent Schools. Small classes, individual attention, supervised study halls, and a close check on the progress of each student characterize the academic program.

## FACILITIES

The Academy can accommodate two hundred and ten boarding students and one hundred and seventy-five day students. Thirty of the boarding cadets are housed in portable housing units. McComb Hall houses classrooms, administrative offices, the library, containing over 5000 volumns, and an eighty seat study hall. The Science Building houses all science classrooms and laboratories. This is the newest building on campus and boosts the most up-to-date teaching equipment available. Guthrie Hall houses three staff members and seventy-five cadets. This dormitory was one of the original buildings, built on the present site in 1901. Extensive renovation was done to this dormitory in 1958. Redus Hall, constructed in 1925, houses two staff members and thirty-six cadets. Gage Hall, erected in 1948, has quarters for three staff members and fifty-five cadets. Kennedy Gymnasium affords facilities for basketball, volleyball, gymnastics, ping-pong, and billiards. It also provides a recreation area with soda fountain, canteen and dressing rooms. The lobby of the gym serves as a visitation lounge for off-campus visitors. Jenkins Infirmary provides ample medical facilities for the Academy, including resident nurse's quarters, examination room, isolation rooms and general ward.

The campus proper contains approximately twenty acres, but the entire school property amounts to one hundred and sixty-seven acres. This acreage is woodland and contains one small lake.
