corted by Ricky Davin.

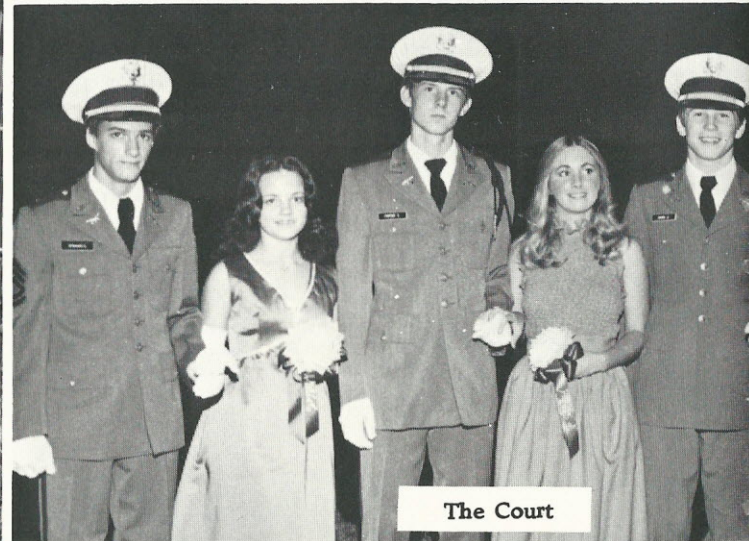
The court, corps, and crowd, enjoyed the game as the Wildcats scored a victory of 27-6 over Parklane Academy.

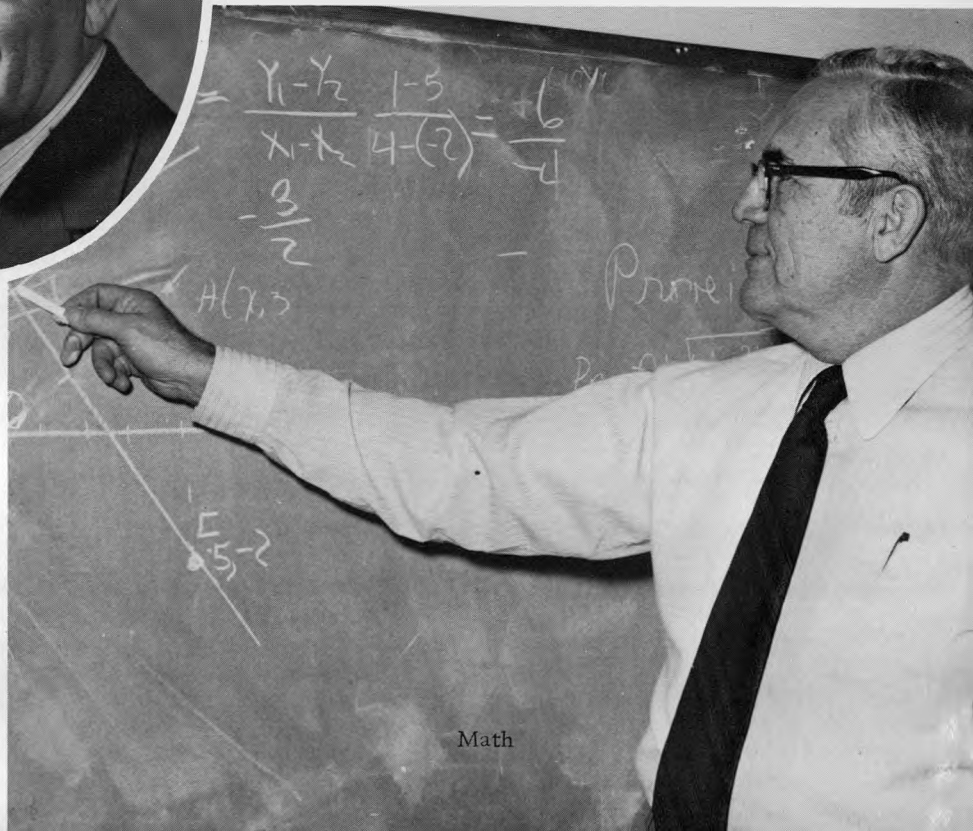
PHILOSOPHY AND

The Academy can accommodate two hundred and ten boarding students and one hundred and seventy-five day students. Thirty of the boarding cadets are housed in portable housing units. McComb Hall houses classrooms, administrative offices, the library, containing over 5000 volumes, and an eighty seat study hall. The Science Building houses all science classrooms and laboratories. This is the newest building on campus and boasts the most up-to-date teaching equipment available.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

The curriculum at Chamberlain-Hunt is essentially college preparatory with sixteen units in the area of English, foreign language, science, mathematics, social studies or business education required for graduation, along with two years of Bible. Subjects offered include those courses required by the major colleges of the South. Instructors are carefully chosen for their professional qualifications and desire and ability to work with young people. The Academy is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, the Mississippi Accreditation Commission and the Mid-South Association of Independent Schools. Small classes, individual attention, supervised study halls, and a close check on the progress of each student characterize the academic program.



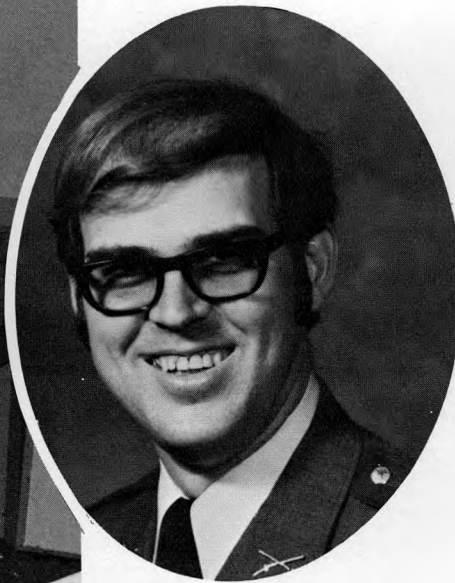

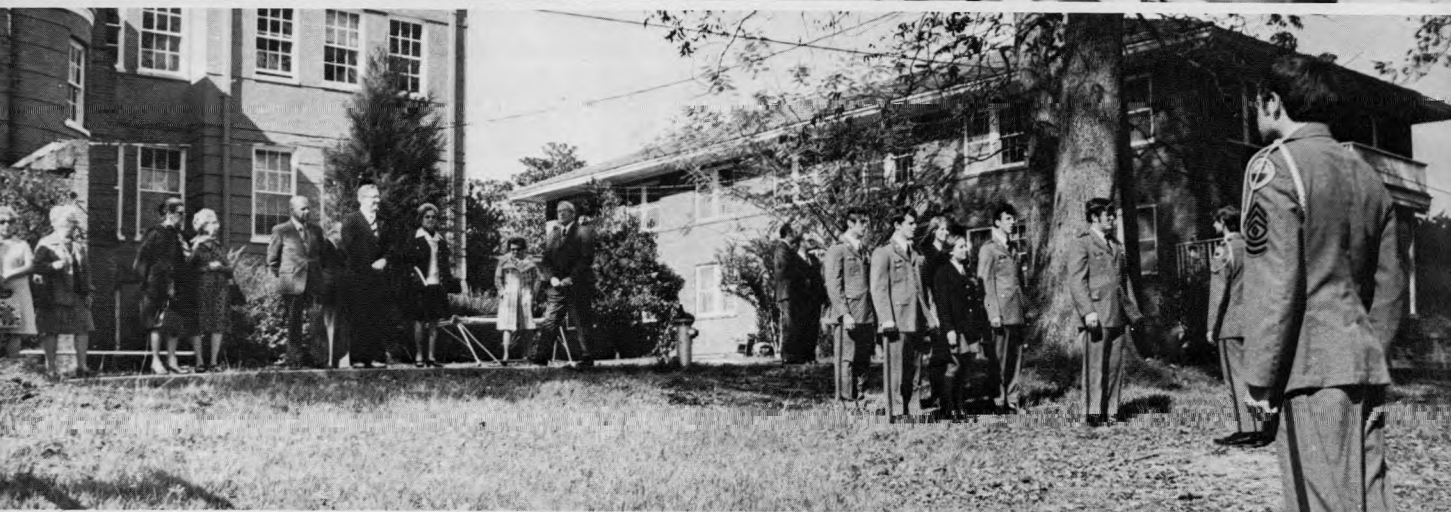
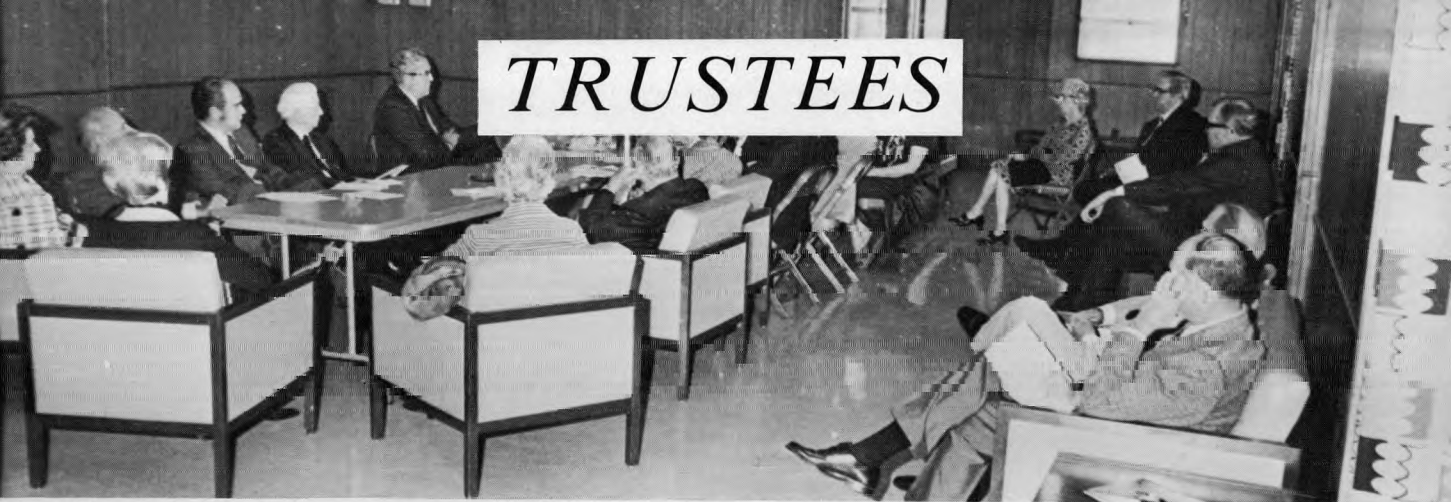

Chamberlain-Hunt Academy is a college preparatory, military school located in the rolling hills of southwest Mississippi at Port Gibson. The Academy enjoys a heritage dating back to 1879 when Mississippi Presbyterians established a secondary school at Port Gibson to offer "a classical secondary education in a thoroughly Christian atmosphere". Chamberlain-Hunt is an outgrowth of Oakland College, which dates back to 1830. Dr. Jeremiah Chamberlain, a Presbyterian minister from Pennsylvania, came to the then largely unsettled and unorganized southwest to bring the message of the Church and to establish an educational institution to train teachers and ministers in this rapidly developing section. Oakland College, in the southwest corner of Claiborne County, close to the banks of the Mississippi River, opened its doors in 1830 under the administration of Dr. Chamberlain and proceeded to enrich the southwest with its many distinguished graduates.

Oakland was most fortunate to have as its Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Mr. David Hunt, a wealthy planter of the area and an ardent supporter of education. Through years of near continuous financial crisis, Oakland survived until the beginning of the great conflict between the States in 1861. The onset of the War saw the staff, faculty and student body alike enter the service of their country. A feeble effort was made immediately after the War to re-open the college, but without the driving leadership of Dr. Chamberlain and the financial acumen of Mr. Hunt, the doors were permanently closed in 1867. After the closing of the institution, the property was sold to the state of Mississippi for the purpose of establishing a negro college. The proceeds of this sale was used to satisfy the creditors of the college and the remainder of the funds were used to establish Chamberlain-Hunt in 1879.

Nixon Vows Energy Bill Veto

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon said Thursday the United States is not going to have gasoline rationing and announced he will veto the emergency energy bill passed by Congress.

“That bill will result in longer gas lines and also would inevitably lead to compulsory rationing in this country, and that we are not going to have, and we should not have,” Nixon said.

It was the most unequivocal statement yet by the President that there won't be any rationing. At a news conference Monday night, he had said chances were much better than 50-50 there would be no rationing, and he had said earlier he wanted to avoid rationing if possible.
