 home of the brave!

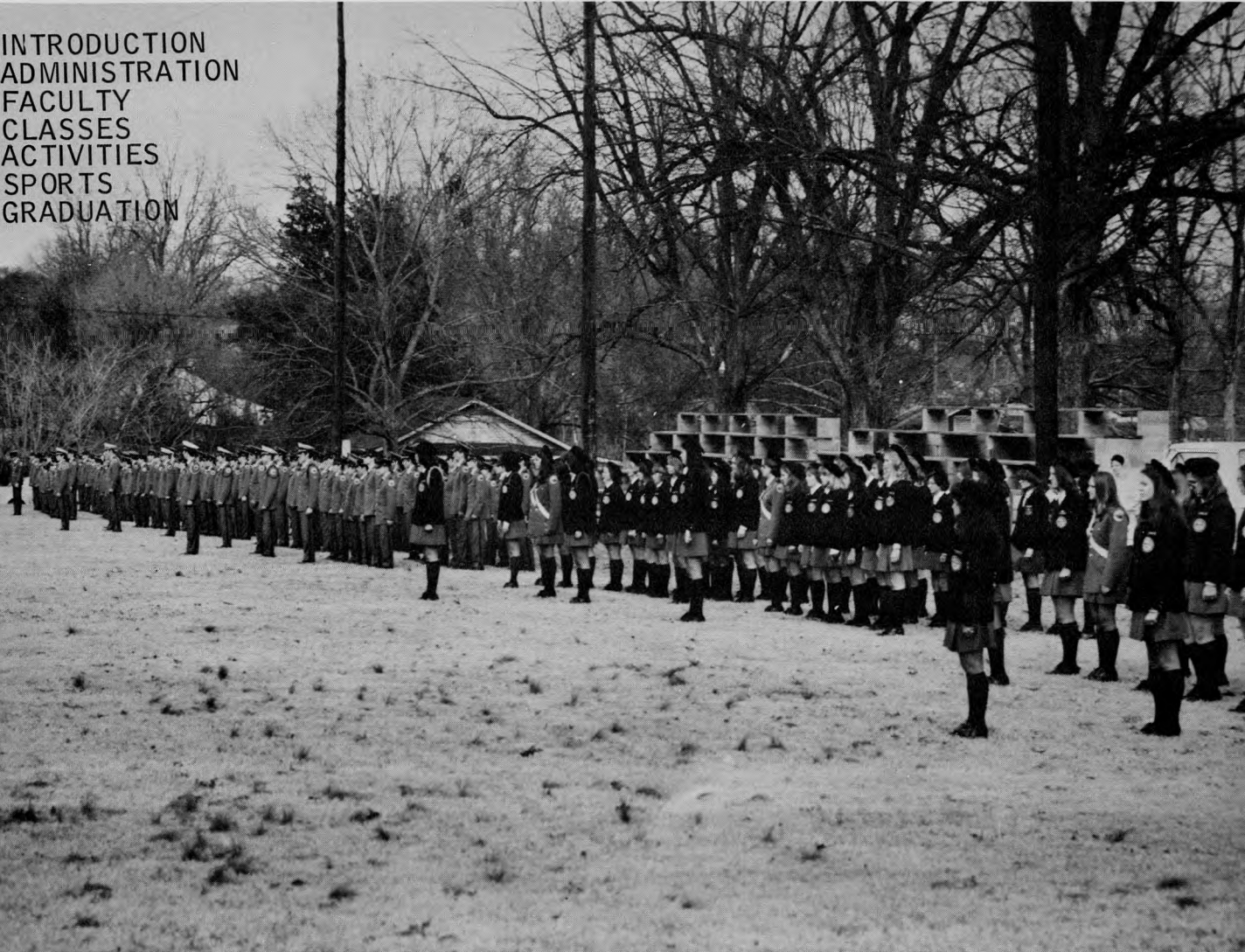
And where is that band who so vaunt-

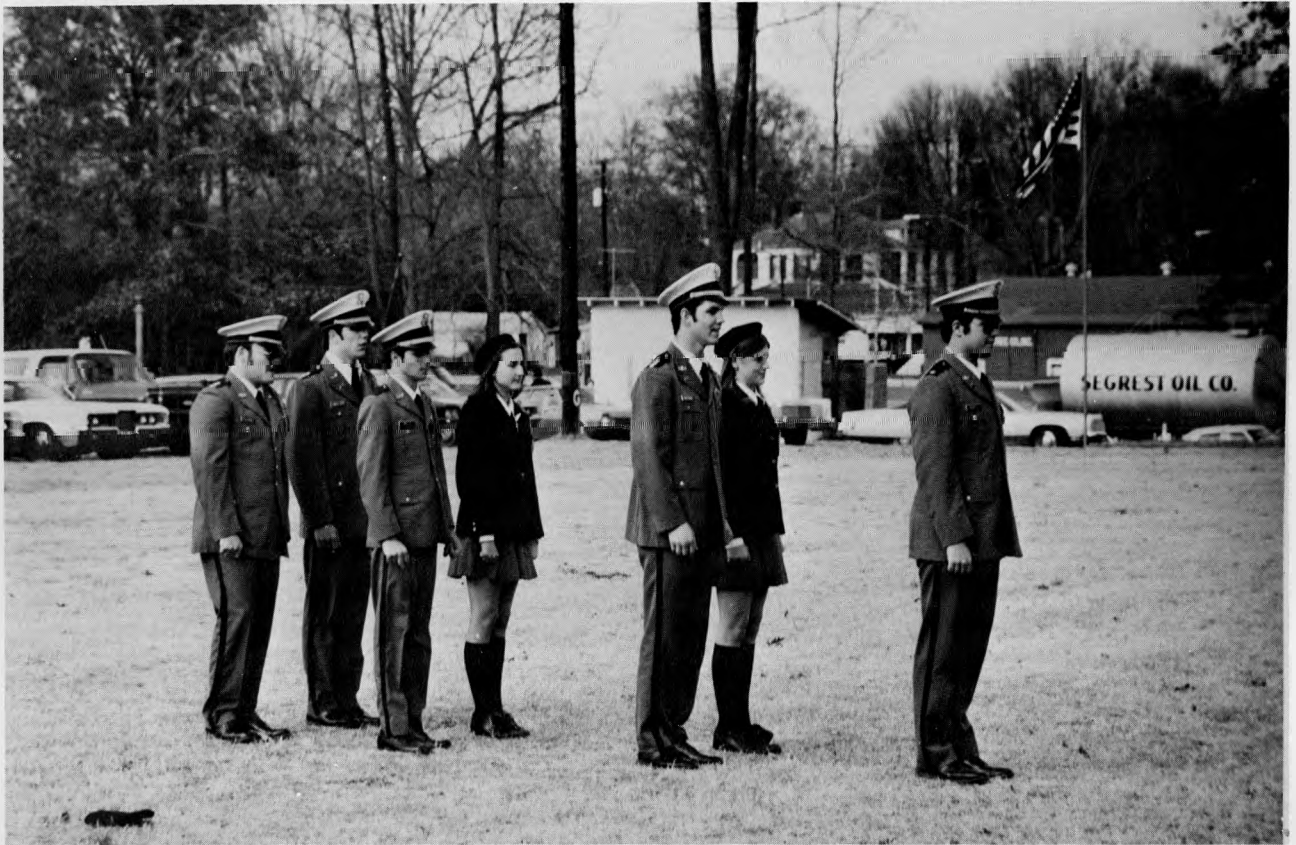

# CHAMBERLAIN-HUNT ACADEMY



Mr. Alford Batton, Chairman of the Board of Trustees-Platform guest.

A co-educational military boarding and day school, grades seven through twelve, owned by the Presbyterian Church U.S.

Established in 1879, the school is named for Jeremiah Chamberlain, a Presbyterian missionary, and David Hunt, a benefactor of the original Oakland College (founded in 1839). Oakland College closed in 1867. Later the property was sold to the State (site of Alcorn A & M University) and part of the funds were used to establish Chamberlain Hunt in 1879.

Chamberlain-Hunt is operated by a Board of Trustees named by the Synod, each of the three Mississippi presbyteries has equal representation on the board. The trustees meet quarterly and an executive committee is named to conduct the board's business on an interim basis.

The facilities of the school include four dormitories, Kathleen McKenzie Hall being added for girls, a classroom building, a gymnasium, an infirmary and three residential buildings. Grounds encompass 170 acres and include an athletic field, practice fields of all types, a 6 acre lake, a rifle range and ample woods area for hiking and camping.

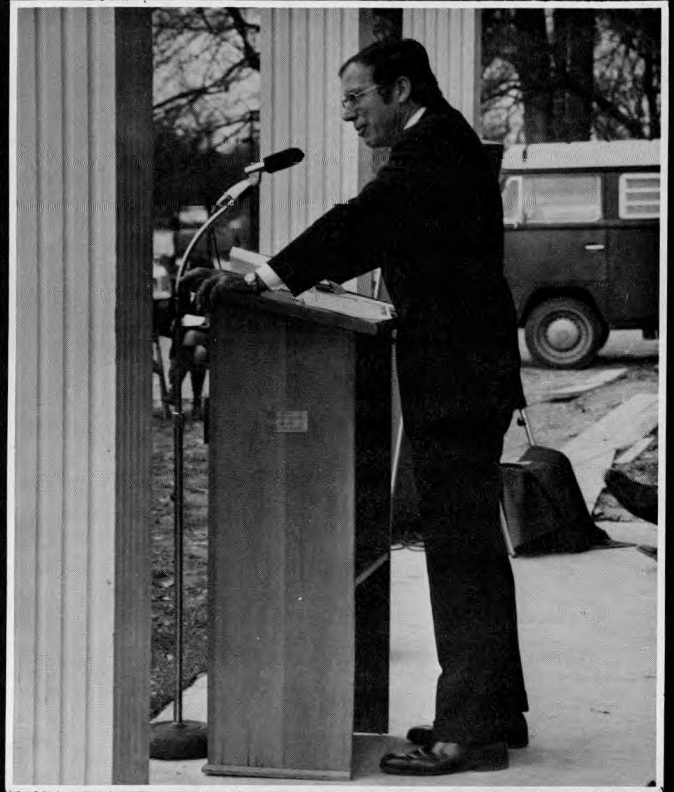

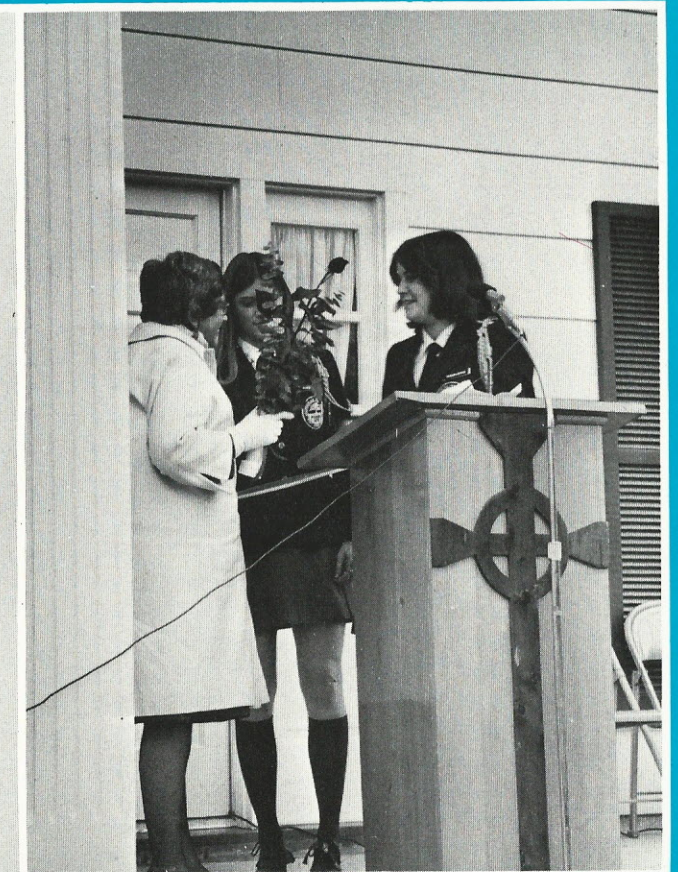

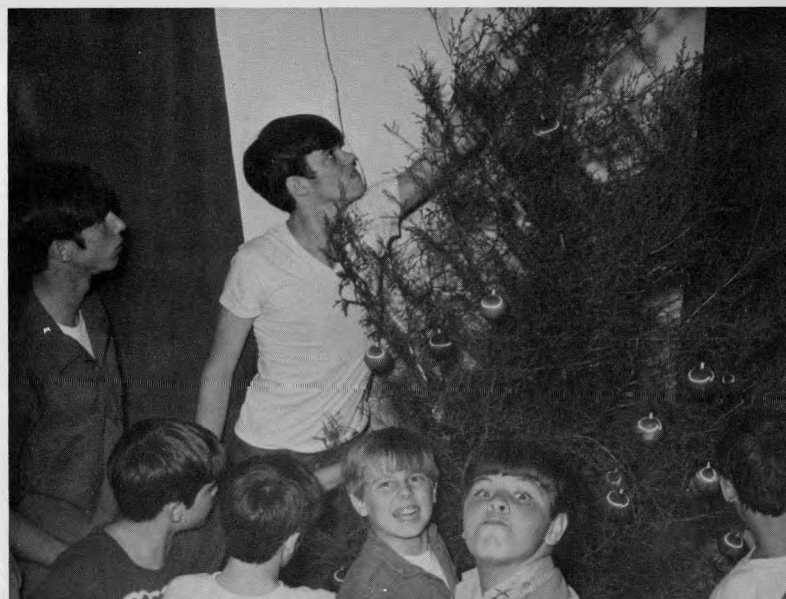


A WHITE CHRISTMAS is celebrated at Chamberlain-Hunt, not with snow, but in GIVING.

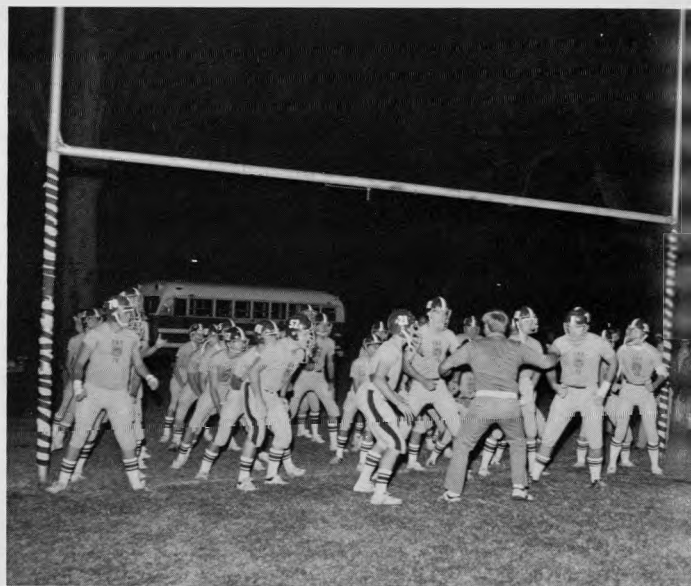

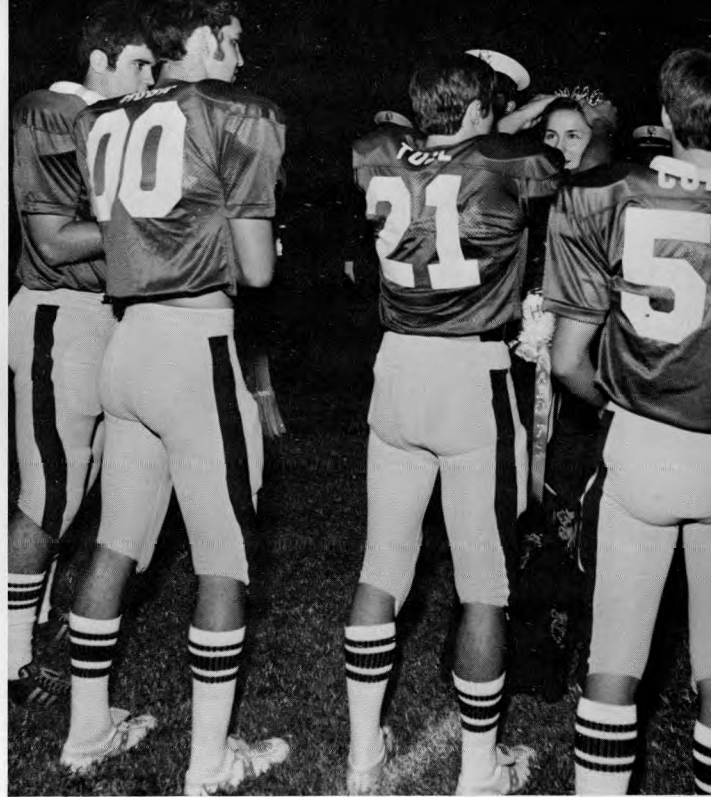

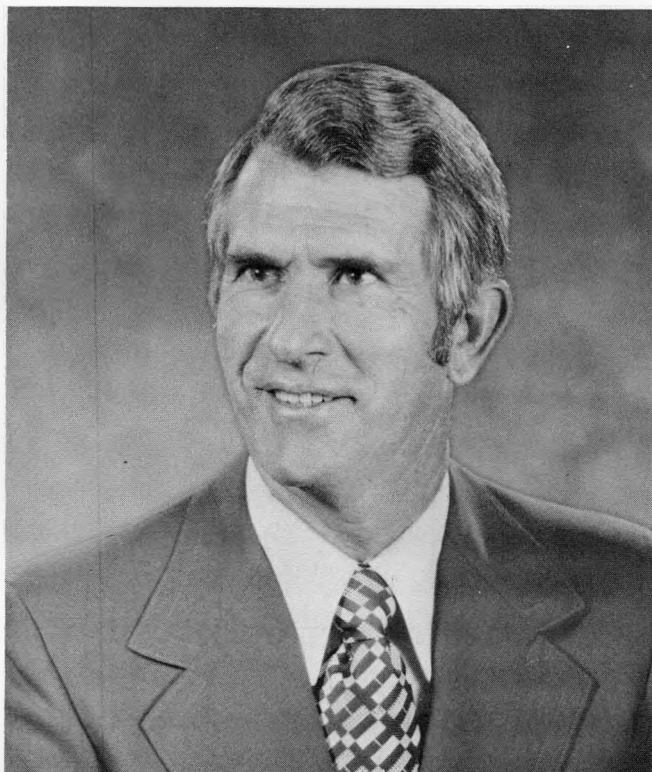

**MR. CHARLES TAYLOR**

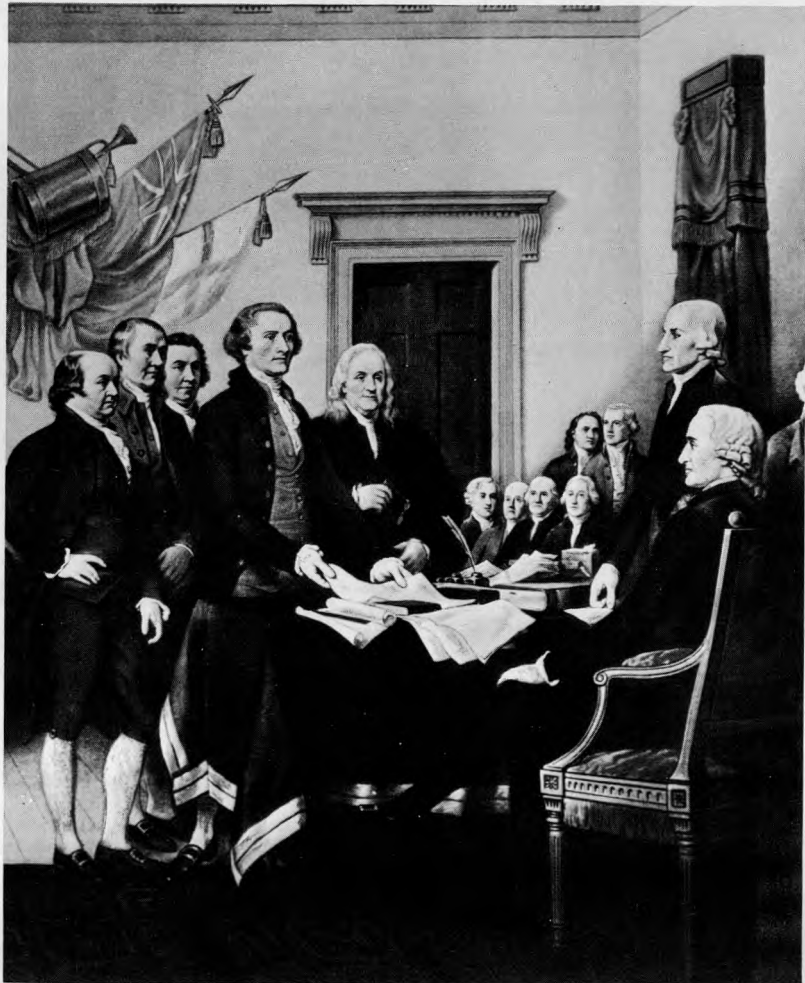

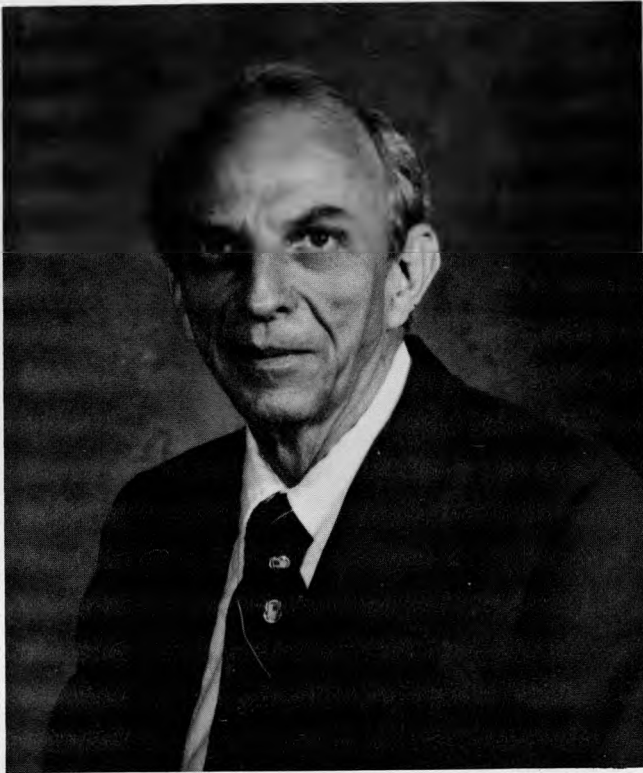
Mr. Taylor is married to the former Colleen Caffey of Duck Hill, Miss. They are the parents of two sons.

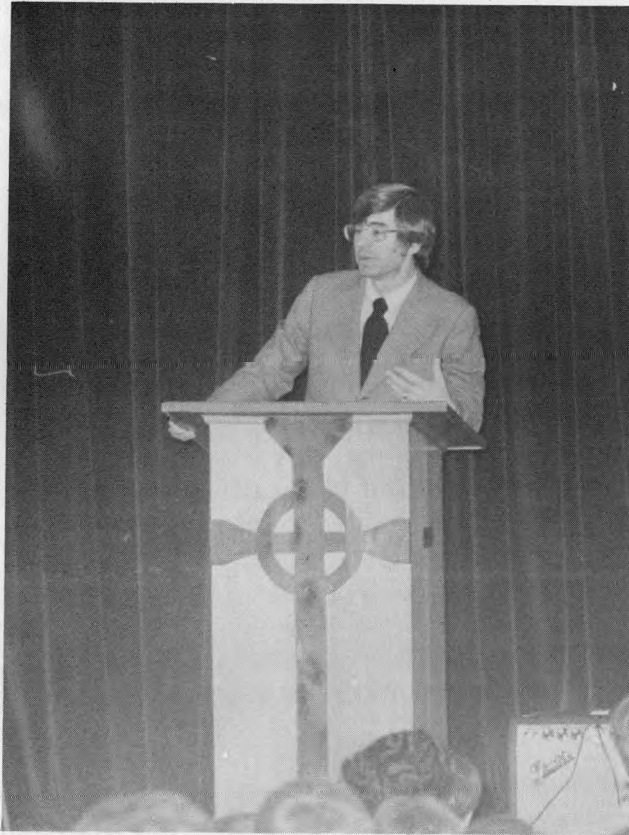
# CHA RELIGIOUS EMPHASIS WEEK

After three weeks of hard practice the wildcats tested their skills in a pre-season jamboree. A torrential rain shower was in progress as the game began, but this didn't hamper the Wildcats as they easily defeated Woodland Hill 20 to 0 in two 12 minute quarters. The wildcats then traveled to Madden, Miss. where they took on the favored AA conference Champions, The Leake Academy Rebels. The Rebels proved to be a much too formidable opponent for the wildcats who were beaten 39 to 7. The wildcat squad suffered another major loss that night as George Donald was pulled from the game because of a shoulder injury. The next weekend's game was a more prideful and crowd-pleasing one. The wildcats outdistanced Oak Forest of Amite La. 14 to 8. Misfortune struck the wildcats the following week when they met a "psyched-up" Copenhatch team and were defeated 33 to 0. The Magnolia game showed the introduction of two new and valuable aspects to the C.H.A. team—Scott Willoughby to the defensive front line, who proved to be a much-needed addition, and the introduction of an explosive offense led by John Tull that enabled the Cats to defeat Magnolia 41 to 0. This began a winning streak for C.H.A. Traveling to take on an expected tough opponent on their homecoming, the Wildcats whipped Simpson Academy 6-0. Chamberlain-Hunts' Homecoming was the most successful in years. A proud and confident team presented the expectant crowd with a 48-0 win over Woodland Hills. The following week's game was the high point of the season as the wildcats downed an "undefeated" Brandon Academy team 28 to 6. This game was highlighted by defensive end, Charles Secoy's wrecking havoc on the Brandon Wishbone. The Wildcats upset another homecoming on Oct. 17 by defeating Miss. Baptist 28 to 0. This night could be described as "John Tull night", because he raced, darted, romped, stomped and dug for 231 yards which put him over 1,000 yards rushing—a feat never before accomplished by a C.H.A. back. The next week, the wildcats coasted to a 28 to 0 victory over Central Private of Baton Rouge, La. The season closed out with a defeat at the hands of rival Thomas Jefferson 30-9. Even though the game was lost the scene at the end of the game was fitting. It portrayed Ralph Moon, one of the finest football players C.H.A. has ever known closing a spectacular football season with a touchdown saving tackle.





As in all teams, this year's wildcats had a strong group of Senior leaders. Arthur Cooper was a two year starter at tackle and was named all conference on both Off. and Def. David Killingsworth was also a standout on both off. and defense. Scott Willoughby and Joey Hawkins both came on as pleasant surprises on defense throughout the season. Their play during the year proved essential to Coach Nelson's aggressive defense. Richard Conn proved over the year to be one of the Wildcats most consistent all around players. The team's running backs, believed to be the best duo in the conference consisted of John Tull and Charlie Secoy. This pair piled up tons of yardage and points, with Secoy doing the bruising and Tull doing the cruising. Tull was an all-conference tailback while Secoy took the same honor at defensive end. This duo combined with multi-talented quarterback, Gary Laramore, were awesome opponents Laramore, besides holding down signal calling, also shone at def. back, where he was named All Conference. Ralph Moon throughout the year starred at virtually every position on the team. Ralph was an all district tight end and linebacker and was also named Most Valuable Defensive Lineman in the conference besides being named to the All State team. Rounding out the Senior Squad was Danney Phillips, Agenor Correia, Jim Faill, and Carey Phillips, Danney was a starter at end throughout the year and was an ample blocker outside. Carey, though hampered by a mid-season injury, was an asset throughout the year. Agenor in his first year came a long way and helped the team to progress. Jim also in his first year came along and played well later in the year, especially against Thomas Jefferson, the last game.

We dedicate this year to the team's Seniors and it's coaches who together with the rest of the team had one of the better teams in the Academy's history.

The relays were begun by the Lions Club last year, and CHA readily accepted the invitation to serve as the host team.

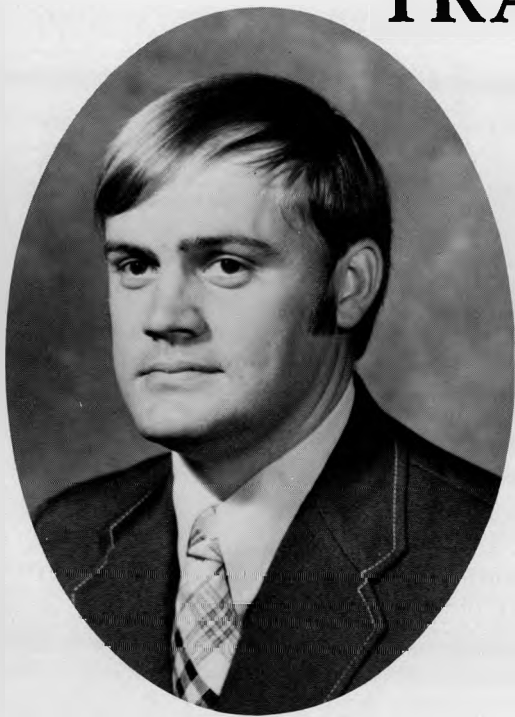
