First, the new Cadets registered and went through three days of Basic Training before begin inducted into the Corps of Cadets. An outstanding group of boys, these new Cadets are, as a group, bright, athletic and good looking! Together with the large number of returning Cadets, we know the Corps will make us proud this year.

You may be interested in some statistics about the 2005-06 Corps of Cadets: It has representatives from 20 states and one foreign country. Just over one-third of the Corps comes from Mississippi and almost one-fifth comes from Louisiana. Georgia and Tennessee tie for third place, each sending nine Cadets. The Corps is 80% Caucasian, 17% African-American and 3% Other. 46% of the Cadets found out about Chamberlain-Hunt through the Internet, and friends or family members referred 38% of the Cadets. One-quarter of the Corps comes from Baptist backgrounds. Six Cadets are females, attending as day Cadets from the local community.

With Cadets the caliber of the current Corps, we are happy to launch a new travel component to our educational opportunities. In September, under the direction of MAJ Rebecca Fulwood, the female Cadets will spend a week in Washington, DC. In addition to tours of monuments, Arlington and the Smithsonian, the Cadets will be hosted by Congressman Chip Pickering (R-MS) for a tour of the Capitol. In October, MAJ Julien Jones will lead a small group of Cadets on a trip to France. MAJ Drew Harris will lead another group to Peru in January.

Through a new on-line store to be opened this semester, the Chamberlain-Hunt Web site will offer a number of items that will make good birthday, Christmas or graduation gifts for your favorite Cadet or alumnus. Look for coffee mugs, travel mugs, glasses, caps, car tags, pens, t-shirts and sweatshirts.

CADET PROFILE: Olzhas Aitzhanov

Faraway names and faraway places... these things give rise to dreams. Though Kazakhstan sounds like it might be found only in fairy tales, this former Russian satellite occupies over 1,000,000 square miles along part of the southern border of modern-day Russia. Composed of mostly Kazaks and Russians, this

multiethnic nation has two main religions: Sunni Muslim and Russian Orthodoxy. It is rich in mineral deposits, as well as in petroleum and natural gas, and exports them and its agricultural products of grain, wool and meat all over the world. With an impressive literacy rate (99% for men and 97% for women) and a rapidly expanding economy, Kazakhstan left its subservience to Russia behind and is forging its own spot in the world

economy. Its geographic location between Russia to the north and China and Pakistan to the east and south, respectively, places it in a key location in today's turbulent world.

Olzhas Aitzhanov, a native Kazak, thinks little of these facts and figures. A typical sixteen-year-old, he spent part of his summer studying geometry in Chamberlain-Hunt's *Adventure Summer School* and earning the title *Cadet of the Week* for his accomplishments during one week of summer school. Math is his favorite subject and, though he admits geometry was a tough course, he knew that he needed it before taking calculus. Aitzhanov returned to Chamberlain-Hunt as a sophomore this autumn.

Cadet Aitzhanov, normally called "OJ," first came to the United States when he was five. Kazakhstan had recently declared its independence from Russia and had become a founding member of the Commonwealth of Independent States. It had also established ties with the United States, having signed an agreement with an American company, Chevron, to develop its oil industry. Aitzhanov spent his next five years in the United States—Houston, Texas to be specific—though his family maintained their home in their native Kazakhstan. When they returned to Kazakhstan, Aitzhanov's older brother remained in Houston, eventually not only attaining his citizenship, but also earning a degree in engineering from the University of Texas and working for Bechtel Construction.

Cadet Aitzhanov lived with his parents in Kazakhstan for the next four years, though visits to the US were frequent. He and his parents returned to the States at least five times a year, and his brother made two or three trips per year back to Kazakhstan. On one such trip, his brother married his Kazak sweetheart and took her back to Houston to live. Not long after, Aitzhanov's parents sent him to live with his brother in Houston, making the brother his legal guardian in this country. It was this brother, in fact, who first heard of Chamberlain-Hunt at the Presbyterian church he attended in Houston.

Now, having tasted different facets of American life, Cadet Aitzhanov himself plans to become a citizen although he will never lose his ties to Kazakhstan.
