

From the president's desk . . .



e have been hearing through the media this past year a great deal about *change*. "Change you can believe in." Of all the change that is taking place in our country, one change stands out to me. One change that I can believe in. That change is taking place at Chamberlain-Hunt. It is not an easy change and it is not free, but it is real and it gives real hope for the future.

The change to which I refer is, of course, the change that takes place in a boy when he understands that his actions have consequences—for himself and for everyone around him. Our principal, Quentin Johnston, is quick to remind Cadets that "if you always do what you've always done, you'll always get what you've always got." It is the same sentiment otherwise expressed in the biblical language "what you

sow, that shall you also reap." It is a very simple lesson, yet so profound. It is a lesson that does not come "naturally"; it must be learned.

Adolescent angst does not like the lesson. It prefers, on the one hand, life to carry on as it did in childhood with Mommy and Daddy shouldering all the responsibility and, on the other hand, life to be free from the constraints of Mommy and Daddy's rules. That many adults try to hold on to this preference is evidence that the lesson must be taught and learned—and too often has not been. That many adults try to hold on to this preference is both sad and scary. Our culture is in crisis because of it.

I have had the great privilege this semester to sit with the seniors in my office and listen to them tell stories about their experiences at Chamberlain-Hunt. Now, having learned the lesson, they look back at the difficulties they formerly faced with academics, behavior or relationships and laugh with a sense of pride. "This isn't the place I've always wanted to be," they say, "but it is where I needed to be." They know they have changed.

The truth is that Cadets do not learn the lesson because we are so good at teaching it, nor because they are so smart as to embrace it. Biblical discipline, nurture and instruction are tools God gives to us, and we are responsible to use them faithfully. However, it is his Spirit who works the change. So, we pray. A lot. We invite you to pray with us for the Cadets in our care, that God would change them from boys to the men their future families and our country so desperately needs.

FOUNDERS DAY: BUILDING ON A SOLID FOUNDATION

ounders Day is the first big event of each school year, held on the Friday Cadets are released for the October Break. It is the first time Cadets get to see their parents since they reported for Basic Training. In addition to this cause for celebration, the purpose of Founders Day is to reflect upon the legacy of two great Christian men—Dr. Jeremiah Chamberlain and Mr. David Hunt—and to encourage one another to follow their godly example of generosity, piety and service.






Each year at Founders Day, Cadets, cadre, parents and friends convene in Oakland

Chapel, where Dr. Chamberlain and Mr. Hunt laid the foundation for Chamberlain-Hunt Academy, for a program that includes inspirational music, special awards and an address. This year's address was delivered by the Reverend Major Marty Fields, who is the senior minister of Westminster Presbyterian Church (EPC), the instructor of apologetics and ethics at Laurel Christian School in Laurel, MS and a chaplain in the Mississippi Air National Guard.

The Alcorn State University Men's Chorus performed a special music selection, Let the Nations Sing.



Each year the Chamberlain Award is given to someone who exemplifies devotion and service to Chamberlain-Hunt Academy. This year the Chamberlain Award was presented to Mr. Charles Taylor. Mr. Taylor came to the Academy in 1956 as the physical education director. In his early years, he served as track coach and as social studies teacher. His gift for administration was recognized, and for over 20 years he served as the Academy's principal. One summer term he served as commandant. In flush times as well as lean times, the Academy could always count on Charles Taylor.



During the autumn term of 1975, and during the entire 1984-1985 school year, he served as the president of the Academy, efficiently managing its affairs while the board sought permanent leadership. Presidents from

Dr. Gruchy to Dr. Randolph came and went, but for 33 years Charles Taylor was always there to guide, support, encourage and maintain the Academy's progress towards academic excellence. Although he retired from his duties in November of 1989, he continued to make Claiborne County his home and

remained a loyal friend and supporter of the Academy until his death on 27 October 2009, at the age of 88, just a few weeks following the Founders Day convocation.

Chamberlain-Hunt bestows the *Hunt Award* each year on someone who generously supports the ministry of Chamberlain-Hunt Academy. This year the Academy presented the Hunt Award to the First Presbyterian Church of Greenwood, Mississippi. Organized in 1846, First Presbyterian Church is a 400 member congregation with


million in total income over the last decade. The congregation strives to show God's love for all of his people through

a large variety of missions and benevolences. It dedicates 27% of its General Budget to mission causes. For many years members have generously supported the ministry of Chamberlain-Hunt through gifts from Sunday school classes, women's circles and congregational benevolences. Their minister, Dr. Rusty Douglas, and Travis Clark of their Witness Committee accepted the Hunt Award on behalf of the congregation.

Prior to coming to Laurel to pastor Westminster, Marty Fields served as a campus minister, a church planter and pastor, a teacher and a research scholar in areas of theological philosophy and apologetics. He has written numerous articles in theology, philosophy, culture and apologetics, and contributed to various books and periodicals

including Table Talk, The Atlanta-Journal Constitution, The Savannah Morning News, USA Today, Reformed Perspectives Magazine, The Biblical Worldview and Premise Magazine. His work on Postmodern philosophy has been used as a resource by Christian schools, colleges and the US Army Chaplain's School. He is currently finishing an introductory book on the defense of the Christian faith.

MAJ Fields knew just what to say. He spent several years at Riverside Military Academy, which had a profound influence on his life: "I went in the fall of 81—28 years ago—and hated it! Why? Because overnight I went from non-conformity to conformity, permissiveness



He then unfolded the reasons he believes the military structure had such a positive impact on his life. "Military schools believe in standards," he said. "They understand the qualities that make for a successful person—discipline, self-respect, respect for others, personal responsibility, integrity and hard work; and they focus on the *kind* of person you need to be, not just on what you *do*." This, he observed, is quite different from the current cultural perspectives, which focus on relative *values* and *personality*. Instead, he challenged the audience to refocus on definite *virtues* and godly *character* that are rooted in biblical norms.

Following the convocation at Oakland Chapel, Cadets, cadre, parents and guests all returned to the Chamberlain-Hunt campus for a celebratory fish-fry (with all the trimmings) under the pavilion. After lunch the Cadets assembled for a final formation before being dismissed for the well-earned October Break.
