# I Am The Clay

The Bible often uses the image of God as the potter and we



as his clay. For example, "Like the clay in the potter's hand, so are you in my hand, O house of Israel" (Jeremiah 18:6b). MAJ Coon's art classes had the opportunity to learn how to make pottery. # Feeling The Pressure?



MAJ Dowell is teaching a lesson in heat, pressure and gas. Most solids and liquids expand when they are heated and contract when they are cooled. The lit matches heat the air inside the bottle. When air is heated it expands (and takes up more room). As the heated air expands, some of it escapes out the bottle. When the matches go out, the air inside the bottle cools and contracts (and takes up less

room), thus creating a lower pressure inside the bottle than outside. The greater pressure outside the bottle forces the egg into the bottle. Cadet Wiersema (on left) and Cadet Johnson (center) are assisting MAJ Dowell with the experiment.



These two young men have been inducted into the Crusader ranks for successfully completing a rigorous 5 day challenge. They are servant-leaders who demonstrate godly character and integrity to their fellow Cadets. Not only are they both Crusaders, but two of the battalion's highest ranked leaders.

Crusader Giordano is in his 5th year at Chamberlain-Hunt. # **Crusader Challenge**

Designed after the Army Rangers' Training, the Crusader Challenge is arguably the most difficult of a Cadet's aspirations while attending Chamberlain-Hunt. Contenders must successfully complete 4 and a half days of physical, mental, psychological emotional and training: standing at attention for 2 hours without moving, running 2 miles in less than 14 minutes and 20 seconds, doing over 50 push-ups under 2 minutes and over 60 sit-ups in the same amount of time. And that is just day one.

During the rest of the week they will train in land navigation, dig fox holes, run through a confidence course, and other similar activities. They will do all of this with only water to drink and one hour or so of sleep at night.

Although Crusader Challenge is not mandatory, eighteen Cadets tried out. Only two completed the challenge. Congratulations to Crusaders Dwiggins (MA) and Ruffin (MS)!
