

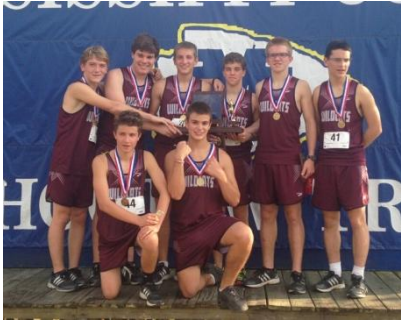
Cross Country Team Wins State!

CHA Holds MAIS Class A Championship Title for 4th Straight Year

For the past three years, CHA has been the MAIS Class A State Cross-Country Champions, and this year we held our title! Last Monday, October 25, the Cross-Country team traveled to Mississippi College's "Choctaw Trails" cross-country course in Clinton for the MAIS State Cross-Country Meet.

Over the last three years, CHA has been blessed with a plethora of talented runners, as evidenced by our three consecutive State titles. This year is no different; Grant Merrill, Arri Williams, and Eddie Forman received 2nd, 3rd, and 4th places, respectively. Overall, CHA finished with 45 points, while the runner-up, Mt. Students Have a Grape Time at Alcorn State

On Tuesday, November 5, 2013, the student body went to Alcorn State University to attend a presentation on agriculture in southwest Mississippi and the horticultural research going on at ASU. We rode the bus out to one of their on-campus agricultural testing plots. Our host, Dr. Girish Panicker, the Director of Alcorn's Center for Conservation Research, then began his demonstration of a few of his many agricultural research projects. He first detailed to us the wide variety of uses for turmeric, mustard, and different tubers grown by the Center for Conservation Research.

Next, Dr. Panicker explained the enormous benefits of consuming muscadine grapes. Did you know that regularly eating muscadines can lower your risk of certain cancers and increase brain function, and that muscadines contain more dietary fiber than oat and bran? Dr. Panicker and his staff then showed off their three different varieties of muscadine vines and demonstrated how to "air-layer" the muscadine plants, a method of rooting the plants in a short time with generally successful results.

We finished our field trip with a stop by ASU's Fruit and Nut Research Orchard. There, we picked Japanese Persimmons, one to eat and one for the road. They were delicious! The trip gave both the student body and the faculty a taste of the world of agricultural research and innovation taking place right down the road from us. Hopefully some seeds were planted in the minds of future farmers, gardeners, and agricultural researchers. 🐾



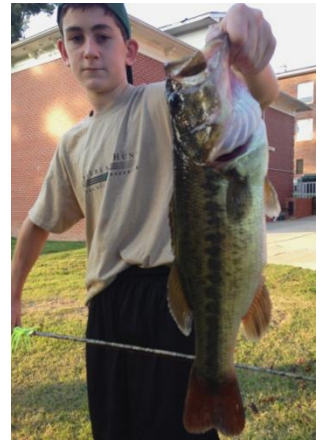
One Fish, Two Fish, Red Fish, Blue Fish...
