

# **Isreal Adventure**

In early April, MAJ Josh Anderson and MAJ Eamon McGraw set off with six Cadets upon what would prove to be an unforgettable trip, a nearly 12 day journey that would take them to



Europe and the heart of the Middle East. Leaving the US – several for the first time – they flew first to Madrid, where they enjoyed a day full of art, architecture and Spanish culture.

After a taste of Europe, the group traveled to Israel. Their initial days in Jerusalem defy description. They visited countless sites and spent many fascinating hours walking through the narrow streets and bustling markets. At night they stayed inside the old city near the Jaffa Gate, one of eight massive gates providing passage through the stone walls enclosing the ancient capital.

From Jerusalem the group made a day trip to the Dead Sea region. There they visited Qumran (where the "Dead Sea Scrolls" were discovered), Jericho and the towering desert fortress of Masada before taking a surreal swim in the Dead Sea.

The next day the eight made their way south where, donning wetsuits and gear, they went scuba diving (with the help of instructors) in the Red Sea. From there the group made day trips into the neighboring countries. On the first of these excursions they set out early and journeyed deep into Egypt's Sinai Peninsula. There they met Bedouins (nomadic desert

tribes living in goat-skin tents) and visited a 1,500 year old monastery. However, the main-event was the ascent of Mount Sinai, a two hour ride on camel-back followed by a breathtaking trek on foot to the summit.

The following morning the group crossed the border into Jordan. Passing through the Valley of Moses, they walked through the "Siq," a narrow canyon leading to the mysterious, hidden city of Petra. Petra, one of the Wonders of the World, is a magnificent and mysterious ancient city with hundreds of tombs and temples carved directly into the rock face of cliffs.

Traveling north again, the eight spent more time in Jerusalem and a day on the Sea of Galilee. Another full day in Madrid capped off the trip, an extraordinary trip that was, for all involved, truly the journey of a lifetime.
