A Special Visitor

On 17 March 2009, LTC Chuck McDougal, retiree of the US Army, visited with junior and senior Cadets. He discussed the career potential associated with joining the armed forces or



enrolling in one of the military academies. LTC McDougal spoke of his experiences in Thailand and Cambodia, his training and work done with the Special Forces in the US Army, and his experience of going to graduate school in

Arizona to get his master's degree in electrical engineering.

He talked about working for the ballistics research laboratory where he helped develop a special armor now used in M-1 tanks. He also talked about accepting an airborne position in Columbia, SC where, over an eight year period, he served as a special operations officer in the Panama and first Iraqi wars. LTC McDougal concluded by describing his exciting five years at Ft. Bragg as a jumper.

LTC McDougal retired in 1996 from the Army after 28 years of service to his country. After his retirement from the military, LTC McDougal began a career in the telephone company.

LTC McDougal now has a son enrolled at the Air Force Academy and urged the Cadets to "never take no for an answer —ever!" He encouraged the Cadets that if they are ever turned down for something they really want, then they should appeal and try again. Both he and his son were turned down for many things for various reasons over the years, only to try again and be accepted.

The Cadets warmly welcomed LTC McDougal and several Cadets took the time to ask about particular aspects of serving in the military.

John Daniel Hull, from Tulsa, Oklahoma, has been a cadet since the tenth grade. He is a squad leader in Bravo Company and holds the rank of staff sergeant. Cadet Hull has been a member of the choir, which has performed for audiences in Port Gibson and beyond. For two years now he has been a member of the Color Guard, and he is a recipient of the Principal's Service Award. He is also a member of the track team, having been a pole vaulter in years past.

WEEKLY CATECHISM

What rule hath God given for our direction in prayer?
